No, this is not on your FM dial! This is the new "Mulch Law" that prohibits combustible material being placed within 18" of your foundation. This fire prevention measure went into effect on Aprl 15, 2025 and all residents/homeowners must comply. If you choose not to comply, LVE will clear the border for you at a cost of \$300.

However, the MUA is backlogged, and we do not have a firm date for them to perform this inspection.

YOU MUST REMOVE COMBUSTIBLE LANDSCAPE MATERIAL (Wood Based Mulch, etc...) ALONG YOUR FOUNDATION BY APRIL 15, 2025

An 18 Inch Non-Combustible Border is Required

2018 International Fire Code, New Jersey Edition N.J.A.C. 5:70-3, 305.6-7

Sections of N.J.A.C. 5:70-3, 305.6-7 are summarized as follows:

305.6 The use of combustible landscape materials, such as wood-based mulch products, is prohibited in any of the following conditions:

- 1. Within 18 inches of any building or structure
- Within 18 inches of a deck, porch, balcony, or any other portion of the building constructed of combustible material
- 3. Within 18 inches of any designated smoking area

305.7 All occupancies subject to this code shall remove all combustible landscape materials that are located within <u>18 inches of the foundation</u> of any building or structure.

You may replace this material with fire-resistant mulch (recycled rubber mulch, topsoil, etc...) and/or live plant material such as shrubs, flowers, and trees provided that they are not beneath a combustible overhang with less than 6 feet of clearance. This material may also be replaced with stone 1" or greater in diameter (Stone size is a Leisure Village East rule).

If you are unwilling or unable to comply, Leisure Village East will remove combustible material at the established fee of \$300 for maintenance work performed in your three-foot area.

One Call Now Program Update March 21, 2025 Wayne Tutzauer

Key Learnings

On March 7, we implemented significant changes to the One Call Now alerting system. Using the features available to us in One Call Now software, we are now able to send text, email, and computer-generated voice alerts. There have been some "Ah-Ha" learnings.

Pros

- Four Hours vs Fifteen Minute Delivery. With the previous voice recorded alert, delivery
 time was measured in hours. This meant that critical or time-bound alerts could take as
 long as four hours to be delivered. Under the new program, all alerts are delivered
 within fifteen minutes. This is especially important for pool-closure alerts.
- Sub-Groups for Pool, Golf, and Club Alerts. Subgroups have been established to allow alerts to be sent to ONLY residents who have signed up for pool and golf course alerts. Clubs may also use this feature to target their club members with meeting notices, updates, etc... I am currently using this for the Entertainment Committee
- Embedded URLs in Text and Email Alerts. When an alert is sent via text or email, it is
 possible to insert a website URL. This opens new set possibilities for notifying residents
 of valuable AARP/other lectures and Demonstrations. It also sets the stage for on-line
 RSVP and Payments for club events. maybe later this year.

Cons

- Computer generated voice is difficult to understand. Many residents have complained
 that the computer-generated voice is difficult to understand. There is a learning curve
 for the person typing text-to-speech messages. Certain word combinations baffle the
 computer, upper case letters and abbreviations get interpreted in bizarre ways, and the
 "voice" is not always easy to understand.
- 2. Voice or Text Only. When the survey was sent out in November, I mistakenly offered the option to receive Voice AND Text. One Call Now will send voice OR text to the same phone number, not both. As a result, there has been some confusion and residents are scrambling to get their choices modified. We are fielding these complaints on a one-by-one basis.

3. Residents having difficulty "Opting-In" for text messages. One Call Now has a prerecorded message that instructs residents how to opt-in to receive text messages. Opt-In is an FCC requirement, and ONLY residents can take action to receive text. It's painless and easy, but many residents are not familiar with texting.

To Opt-In:

Text the word ALERT

TO:

4. Truncated Text Messages and voice messages; One Call Now is an Alerting system, not social media. This requires a paradigm change in how One Call Now is being used. Increasingly, clubs are using One Call Now as their advertising and marketing tool. In addition to basic information, dates, time, and prices, these alerts attempt to relay superfluous information (menus, band names, marketing, etc..) that is better conveyed via handouts and posters in Barton Hall. Every club has a bulletin board and interested residents should be referring to the bulleting boards.

Problem Resolution

1. Computer generated voice is difficult to understand. As of Friday, March 21, Barton Hall will make two One Call Now alerts:

For residents who selected VOICE alerts, Karen has reverted to her recorded voice message, like everyone received prior to March 7. A four-hour delivery time is expected.

Karen will also create a separate EMAIL and TEXT version of the Same Alert – edited for length. Residents who chose email and text will receive these alerts. Expect a fifteen-minute delivery time.

Pool and Golf course updates (closures/re-open) will receive computer voice, email and text alerts within the fifteen-minute delivery window. Note: Pool closure alerts will be made by pool monitors using canned messages. The fifteen-minute delivery time is crucial for weather alerts at the pool. There is no option for a human voice.

2. Truncated Text Messages. I am working with Barton Hall to establish text message guidelines – keeping text messages at a manageable length. We ask clubs to rely on their bulletin boards and posters to convey detailed event information.

3. **Difficulty "Opting-In".** I host a One Call Now Trouble Desk at many Barton Hall events (coffee house, open meeting, etc..) where residents can talk to me directly to have their One Call Now issues resolved.

Summary

Moving to the new One Call Now process for 1400+ residents was a daunting task. We expected bumps in the road, and we are working diligently to ensure that we meet everyone's needs.

It would have been easy to leave it alone. But, while meeting the needs of our current residents, Leisure Village East needs to move forward to also meet the needs of many current and future residents.







There weren't many Jewish families living in Kearny. In fact, in public school we recited the Lord's Prayer. In assembly, we learned hymns such as Holy, Holy, Holy and Faith of our Fathers. We also helped with Christmas decorations.

When I started Hebrew school at the age of 8, I found Hebrew to be an extremely difficult language to learn. I also probably made the Rabbi's life hell with all my questions. For example I thought Jonah being swallowed by a whale was a bit far fetched. I also asked the Rabbi why we don't believe in Jesus. He almost fell off the chair. He thought for a moment, said that Jesus was a good man and taught good lessons, but Jews don't believe he was the son of God. We are still waiting for the Messiah. Personally, I respect everyone's beliefs. There's no right or wrong. Our Hebrew teachers were Holocaust survivors. They still had numbers tattooed on their arms.

We also learned about our customs and traditions. Most important we learned about our history. We also learned a lot in the home. I remember my mother lighting the Sabbath candles on Friday nights.

On Friday nights, we had to attend services. None of us wanted to be there. I didn't want to miss I dream of Jeannie. We went to services to prepare for our Bar of Bat Mitzvah. You needed to know the prayers, songs and readings. You also had to recite a portion of the Torah. In order to do this this, you received a booklet and record. I was able to use the record to memorize my Torah portion, but didn't understand a word of what I was saying.

My mother advised me to perform it, and perform I did. That was the only I could get through it.

As soon as the Rabbi gave the benediction, we also said Shabbat shalom let's go home.

I grew up in the northeast Bronx, NY, not far from the Westchester border. It was a lovely area, much sought after at the time. Although I lived in a huge apartment complex, also much sought after, I might add; directly across the street there was an empty lot filled with trees, and another lot of flat land. To the left of the lots, there were two single-family houses, to the right, a fire station. We had endless fun, summer and winter across the street from our home.

One weekend day, a priest came to visit my father. I was very young; around 7 years old. When the priest left, I asked my mother why he had come to our home. She told me he came to see my father because the archdiocese wanted to build on the land across the street. My father was a surveyor. Would he survey the property for them. The actual church was going to be built some blocks away. It would take time. Meanwhile, they needed to establish a congregation. The plan was to erect a building on the flat land across the street for that purpose.

And so, the Catholic Men's Club was erected, and a small parish was established. The church itself was built down the hill on Boston Road and 212th Street; St. Philip and James Catholic Church. With the large apartment complex and all the single-family homes

These are words to live by. I learned them at Holy Family College in Philadelphia, an all-girls college, now a co-ed university. Believe it or not, tuition and room and board were less than two thousand dollars. I had a small scholarship, a National Defense Loan and had to borrow about four hundred dollars each semester, which I paid off by working in the library. The National Defense loan was paid off by me working in the public schools of Philadelphia.

Those days were so innocent. I lived in the dorm and we had restrictions, being in at a certain time and lights out by ten.

Ciotka, (Chuch) our Polish aunt, made sure we followed the rules during the day. At night, there was a nun who lived on each floor of the dorm who enforced the rules. There were rooms in the basement to study and type after hours. Surprisingly, there was also a room we called the smoker where girls could smoke and hang out. They were the cool kids. I tried smoking, but it wasn't for me. And, by the way, we were not allowed to wear pants, only in extreme weather. Our class changed all of that. Pants could be worn by the time we graduated.

We did have a kitchen available to us. Things would disappear from the refrigerator and sparks would fly.

For meals we went to another building where we were served by Postulants (high school girls who were probationary candidates to become nuns). We had to sign up for each meal.

During the day, we went to classes which were in the one college building. There was a cafeteria there where you met up with friends. At night we studied and then had fun. As I said, lights were supposed to be out by ten and we were supposed to be in our own rooms. As you can imagine, after hours, we of course gathered in one room, played records, ate snacks from the vending machines, and had fun. The knock on the door came, everyone went into the closets and under the beds. My room mate and I would smile sweetly when the nun opened the door and found us quietly studying. One time there was a flashing metal saw horse on the property. We decided that the resident nun might appreciate it outside of her door. We quietly carried it up to her room only to hear a very angry nun, never opening the door, saying, "Get that thing out of here." We figured she saw us coming.

My absolute favorite thing to do was to sing in the Glee Club. We had a wonderful director, Mr. Fiss. We wore black, bare shoulder tops and long black skirts, with long white gloves. We sang at home and away at the boy's colleges. I loved it when my parents came to our concerts, to see the pride on their faces.

I loved going into the city and walk through the major department stores. I also, had to learn how to use public transportation. It was new to me having grown up in Wall Township.

If we were walking back to the campus at night after going to the Goalie for pizza, scared of our own shadow, I had a friend who would shout, "Me first mugger."

You were allowed to go away for the weekend. But it had to be approved as to where you were going. Also, if you broke the rules, like coming in after hours your punishment was staying on campus for the weekend.

To our chagrin, pre-cell phones, there was only one phone on each floor, usually hogged by the girls who had boyfriends.

These are just a few of my non-sequitur, treasured memories.

Here in the sheltered college run by the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth, I made wonderful friends (both dormies and day hops). I not only had an excellent education but I learned some of the ropes of the real world to prepare me for life. I wouldn't change a minute of the time I spent there.

Pass the Tissues Please

Growing up in an Italian family during the early 1960's, I can tell you from my own experience, that Italians almost always add passion and drama to every situation. Especially when it comes to some of our Catholic beliefs and experiences.

I remember as a small child visiting st. Lucy's Church in Jersey City. My Grandma Grace always had trouble with her eyesight and as we all know, St. Lucy is the Patron Saint of people who are suffering any sort of vision problem. So on the weekday mornings that we visited my grandmother, she would walk me, and my sister, to St. Lucy's to make a novena. Upon entering the vestibule of the church, my grandma would take a tissue from her pocketbook and carefully separate the two layers of tissue. Then she would take out a few bobby pins and pin one layer of the tissue to each of our heads. And even though my sister and I couldn't have been more then four or five years old, we knew this was a very embarrassing situation. But in those days women were not allowed to enter a church with an uncovered head. So in we went with a tissue bobby pinned to the top of our heads. Once inside the church, we became aware of the eerie echo our footsteps caused when hitting the marbled floors. As we looked around we could see various statues on pedestals. Some small and some very large. Some saints would be holding spears, some would have snakes wrapping around them. Or what about the nightmare inducing statue of st. Catherine holding her own severed head! Small clusters of women would gather at the base of one of these saints depending on their need, or the particular "favor" they were requesting. They would pray, and ask the saint to intercede before God on their behalf. They considered these saints their Patron Saints. The women would be dressed in all black. Dresses, stockings, shoes, and coat. And instead of a tissue pinned to their hair, they had what looked like an intricately designed black doily pinned to their hair! I couldn't wait till I graduated to wearing a black doily. It would be a rite of passage. And as the three of us silently walked hand in hand, we listened to the whispered prayers of these devoted women as they prayed. While I could not understand Italian, even as a small child I understood how much those words meant. I could feel them. There was a passion behind these foreign words. As we stopped to stare at the scene before us, my grandma would take me, and my sister, by the hand and walk with determination to her particular Patron, St. Lucy. To say I was not prepared for what I was about to see would be an understatement. There before us was one of the tallest statues I have ever seen. As I looked up, I saw St. Lucy

starring down at me. She was holding a palm branch in one hand, and in the other hand was a huge plate holding two of the largest eyeballs I had ever seen! Eyeballs staring down at me - on a plate. I guess that would make sense knowing she was the Patron Saint for people with vision problems, but I was only five years old! This was a visual that to this day I can not unsee. I turned to my grandma for comfort, but she was deep in prayer. So all my sister and I could do was hide behind her, covering our face with the bottom of her dress. I felt those eyeballs staring at me for what seemed to be hours.

A few years passed, and it was time to enter grade school. As a child I attended St. Anthony's School in Union City. In those days only nuns taught in our classrooms. Filippini nuns to be exact. They wore a black habit that reached to the floor. Their long black "veil" covered every bit of hair they might have had. The best part of their outfit was the very large set of rosary beads that was attached to their waist. I loved to watch the large crucifix at the bottom bounce up and down against their leg as the passed by. In fact, the more intense their mission, the bigger the bounce! And if you notice, I fail to use the word "walk". That's because for the first few years of attending school we all thought the nuns moved on wheels! An honest mistake given the fact that we never saw their feet, and they never seemed to actually "walk". They glided in a one smooth motion. And while the nuns would portray themselves in angelic terms, as students who spent all day in their presence, we got to witness another side. Like their ability to hit their intended mark with a four foot wooden stick, with a rubber tip, from as far away as six feet. One swift swoosh! No warning, no noise when their shoes hit the floor to give themselves away (reinforcing the wheel theory). Witnessing this, you thought twice before picking up that pencil with your left hand, or whispering to the kid next to you when you should have been quietly reading. Certainly made you develop a respect for the rules, but at the same time it could also cause you to develop quite the nervous tick! On special occasions, we would visit the church next door as a special treat, or to celebrate a holy day of obligation. However, this visit could also turn in to a valued learning experience. As we all silently walked into church with our heads bowed, and our hands in a prayer position, we looked like little angels. The children of God. We slipped into our assigned pews, but not before genuflecting before the giant crucifix hanging behind the alter. As we sat

there waiting for the entire school to enter, we would understandably start to fidget. And some kids would start a quiet conversation with the student sitting next to them. Wrong! That's where we learned of the nuns super human strength. That nun was instantly behind that unsuspecting student, and with one swift motion, she would lift that poor kid up by part shirt, and part hair, and heave them right out of their set and over that pew! It brought new meaning to the words "here one minute, gone the next"! Worse yet, that unlucky student received the honor of being Mother Superior's buddy for the rest of the mass.

As more years passed, my family developed a strong devotion to St. Ann, the mother of the Blessed Mother Mary, and of course Jesus's grandma. She is the patron saint of mothers and grandmothers. We prayed to St. Ann to intercede on our behalf to bring my daughter healthy children, and in turn giving us the blessing of becoming grandparents. We went to Hoboken weekly to visit St. Ann's Church. A beautiful church filled with all of our Italian traditions. Large statues of saints along the walls. The marble floors echoing our footsteps. The women dressed in black whispering their prayers with deep devotion. But the one area of the church that touches me deep into my soul is the tiny room off the vestibule as you walk into the church. There inside the room is the most beautiful eight foot statue of St. Ann sitting upon a pedestal. On this pedestal surrounding St. Ann you will find prayer cards, birth announcements, baby shoes, and many pictures of beautiful babies. All left in thanks by moms and grandmas who have witnessed God's gift of a new baby with the help and intercession of St. Ann on their behalf. To witness the depths of their gratitude is humbling. All the women of the parish, however, show their honor and devotion on St. Ann's feast day - July 26th. While her feast is celebrated all week with music, food, and their famous zepoles, July 26th is a solid day of devotion. And while this day is the most beautiful of traditions, I will save this beautiful memory for another day

Dogs must have a 6ft length leash and pick up after your furry friend has done his/her business.


Only residents in good standing that do not have any outstanding open balance over 60 days will be allowed access to the pool, bar code, amenities and work orders.



The Price of Freedom

April 19 marked the 250th anniversary of the beginning of the American Revolution with the Battles of Lexington and Concord. General Thomas Gage, royal governor of Mass., ordered his 700 British troops to seize the colonists' military stores in Concord. They were met at the Lexington green by 77 local minutemen. This encounter left 8 colonists dead with 10 wounded and resistance quickly faded. The British moved on to Concord. A British covering party at the North Bridge was confronted by 320-400 American patriots and forced to withdraw. Their march back to Boston proved to be an ordeal, with Americans sniping at them from behind roadside buildings, trees and stonewalls. Total losses were British 273, Americans 95. When these battles took place, the colonies did not have an Army. Each colony relied on a militia composed of part-time civilian-soldiers. On June 14, 1775, the Continental Congress authorized the enlistment of expert riflemen to the United Colonies for one year. This Continental Army became the first truly national institution and an experiment in nationhood. Led by General Washington, the Continental Army won our war for independence.

Since May is the home for one of our most sacred national holidays, I thought it fitting to tell the stories of 3 men who gave their all during WWII - all Medal of Honor recipients from New Jersey. Joseph John Sadowski (Dec. 8, 1917-Sep. 14, 1944) joined the Army from his birth city of Perth Amboy in 1941. As a commander with the lead tanks of Combat Command A, his tank was hit and disabled by an intense barrage of enemy fire from the streets and buildings in Vahey, France. The suddenness of the attack caused confusion among the remaining tanks. As his crew evacuated, the tank burst into flames. However, Joseph realized that one crew member was still in the tank. He returned to the tank and tried to open the jammed hatch but was cut down by machine gun fire. His sacrifice so inspired the remaining tank crews that they ferociously destroyed the enemy force without further loss of American lives. He was 26.

John W. Dutko (Oct. 24, 1916 - May 23, 1944) joined the Army from Riverside, NJ. Private Dutko was serving in the 30th Infantry Regiment near Ponte Rotto, Italy. He single-handedly destroyed 3 German machine gun nests and their gunners as well as one 88mm artillery gun. Though wounded twice, he kept going, and after disabling the 3rd machine gun he died, his body falling across the dead German crew. He was posthumously promoted to first sergeant and awarded the Medal of Honor (as well as a Purple Heart). He was 27.

Horace Marvin "Buddy" Thorne (Sep. 29, 1918-Dec. 21, 1944) was born in Keansburg, NJ, and grew up on a farm in North Middletown. He joined the Army from Keyport. On March 3,1944, while on leave, Buddy married Leah Pinson the sister of someone in his unit. On December 21, he was the leader of a combat patrol near Grufflingen, Belgium. Their mission was to drive German forces from their dug-in positions. A German tank suddenly appeared. It was quickly disabled, and Buddy left his cover to take out the tank crew. He then voluntarily took up an exposed position on top of the tank and killed or wounded 8 Germans. He scattered the confused crews of 2 enemy machine gun nests but his gun jammed and he was killed. He was 26. He was originally buried in a Belgium forest but his remains were later returned home. His brother-in-law, being in the same unit, witnessed his death. He was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor, a Purple Heart and the Croix de guerre (Belgium). His last name was familiar to me and I was able to determine that a relative of Buddy Thorne lives in LVE. Yvonne Thorne confirmed that Buddy was a cousin of her father-in-law. She also added that Thorne Middle School in Middletown, NJ, was named in his honor.

This Memorial Day, remember to honor our veterans.

Fire Safety

- 1. Kerosene, wood or coal heating devices or stoves, and the fuel for their use, are prohibited on LVE property.
- 2. Outdoor grills must be propane. They must be at a distance of no less than five (5) feet from any structure when in use. When not in use the grill must be kept outside and the propane tank must be shut off or disconnected from the grill. Also, make sure it does not interfere with lawn cutting when not in use. Empty propane tanks may, if necessary, be stored in the garage only. These tanks must be empty and the tank valve must be open. Please use sensible care and follow all manufacturer's directions for care, use and storage.
- 3. Fire Tables are permitted but must obey the following guidelines:
 - Must be propane, natural gas or gel only.
 - Must have a tempered wind guard of at least six (6) inches in height.
 - A unit owner/resident must be present at all times to monitor the area when an open-flame device is in use, and is responsible for any damage to structures, patios, fences and landscaping. Any damage caused by an open-flame device that requires repair or replacement will be billed to the unit owner.
 - Must follow the same rules as required for propane grills.



Lithium-ion Batteries May Cause Fire Hazard

The number of fires stemming from the lithium-ion batteries commonly found in electronic bikes (e-bikes) and mobility scooters is rapidly rising, according to the National Fire Protection Association. In 2022, at least 19 people died in the United States because of fires or overheating incidents related to battery-powered products. In New York City alone, the batteries caused 216 fires, resulting in 147 injuries and six deaths in 2022.

Regulations

While there are currently not many regulations concerning e-bikes and mobility scooters, lawmakers and federal regulators in the United States are taking note of the risk lithium-ion batteries pose.

Prevention

The following can help prevent an e-bike/mobility scooter fires from occurring:

Never use an off-brand or after-market replacement battery or charger. Cheap, high-voltage options are the cause of many fires.

Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.

When charging, storing and maintaining an e-bike/ scooter battery, the manufacturer's instructions should be adhered to before taking any action or making any decisions.

Don't store e-bike/mobility scooter batteries with a full charge. The more charged a battery is, the more fuel there is for the chemical reaction that causes fire.

Charge e-bike/mobility scooter batteries away from flammable materials. E-bike/mobility scooter batteries should be charged away from furniture and should not be charged or stored in a location that blocks access to exits.

Contact the manufacturer directly with any issues.

Most companies will replace faulty batteries as long as they haven't been tampered with. Take pictures or videos to send to the company's support team.


Don't mess with the battery. Only someone with specific e-bike/mobility scooter battery training should be servicing and replacing batteries.

Conclusion

As owning and operating an e-bike/mobility scooters becomes more popular, taking precautions is important to remain safe, especially because we live in attached houses here at Leisure Village East.
